Joseph Charles Plunkett Ph.D, P.E., 79 of Black Rock; died suddenly Sunday June 9, 2013 at Lake Charles State Park.

Born December 3, 1933 in Centerville, TN; son of Harold and Lorraine Lewis Plunkett.

He is preceded in death by his parents and a brother, Malcolm L Plunkett.

His educational experience was a Ph. D. in Electrical Engineering, Texas A&M University; MSEE Electrical Engineering, Georgia Tech; BSEE Electrical Engineering, University of Tennessee; BS Mathematics and Physics, Middle Tennessee State University; Graduate work at John Hopkins University, Northeastern University, and Florida Institute of Technology. He worked several years as a development engineer in the defense industry at Martin Marietta Corporation, Raytheon Company, and the IIT Research Institute. His accomplishments in the industry and education are documented in numerous international publications, including Marquis' Who's Who in the World, Who's Who in America, and the International Book of Honor, and he had received numerous professional and teaching honors and awards.

He was a Captain during fifteen years of service in the Army Reserve/National Guard; and he worked as a Registered Professional Electrical Engineer and a retired Professor of Electrical Engineering at California State University in

Fresno, CA; he was also of the Church of Christ belief.

Survivors include his brother, Lloyd Donald Plunkett of Centerville, TN; several nieces and nephews; special friends, Mr. and Mrs. James Houston of Black Rock; and many other relatives and friends.
